Typically, Class A commercial licenses are required for operating large vehicles with two or more axles, such as tractor-trailers or semi-trucks, which have a Gross Vehicle Weight Rating (GVWR) of over 26,000 pounds and towed vehicle rate exceeding 10,000 pounds. Class C commercial driving licenses are for drivers who operate smaller vehicles such as passenger vans, minivans, stretch limousines, trucks, or buses that can transport between 16 to 23 passengers including the driver. They can also drive a variety of other vehicles not covered by Class A or B licenses. Furthermore, drivers with a Class C license can also operate large HazMat vehicles for transporting hazardous materials rated dangerous or unstable by law and are required to be placarded under the Hazardous Materials Transportation As part of their job requirements, HazMat drivers must undergo fingerprinting and pass a TSA assessment and knowledge test. Class D licenses permit operators to drive heavy-duty trucks hauling trailers exceeding 10,000 pounds in combined weight, as long as the total gross combination weight rating stays under 26,000 pounds. Military personnel, too, need a Class D license for operating campers or large vehicles for military purposes. Notably, these commercial licenses can be used for personal recreational vehicle towing, so long as the trailer weighs less than 10,000 pounds. A surprising fact is that a Class D driver's license doubles as your state ID card, although the reverse isn't true - your state ID only serves as proof of identification and doesn't grant driving privileges. These endorsements are denoted by a single letter on the license, depending on the qualification type.
